

## **Product Corner**

#### Helmet SunBlocker

on't you just love heading out on your motorcycle, early in the morning, heading East, directly into the rising sun. Well summer is here and especially in Southern California we have a lot of those clear skies and really sunny days. Those of you who wear helmets with face shields, know that when you are looking

directly into the sunlight, those smoke tinted shields just do not block out enough of the glare to actually allow you to see where you are going. And if you go to a very dark shield or darker sunglasses, you lose a lot of traffic detail when you turn away from the sun.



Originally developed for aviation (interesting that these inventions are always developed either for aviation or the military) the SunBlocker is a translucent, tinted, narrow plasticized-polymer film which adheres to the very upper portion of the inside of your face shield via static electrical charges like a decal. It is easy to install applying a small amount of soapy water then just slide into place, and it is removable and transferable to other helmets.

Since it sits at the very top of the face shield, above your line of sight, it doesn't get in the way of your normal visual area. Most of the time as you turn into the sun, which is normally high in the sky, you don't even notice that the strip is blocking the rays. As the sun sets just drop your

head a short distance so that you block the glare but can still see through it.

I have used this device on all my helmets and would not ride without one. It is universal and works with almost any type of face shield Why put up with the proverbial "riding into the sunset" blinded and wondering where you are going or worse where you will wind up. Do you really enjoy riding with one hand blocking the sun's glare or squinting to a point where you can hardly make out the road. Think safety here!

Try this strip, you'll love it!

# JB's Excellent Adventure Exploreing CA's Trinity Alps

mong other things, what I recall the most were the beef-jerky signs which all seemed to point to the quaint hamlet of Happy Camp; also home of the would-be big-foot.

But we were there to raft the Klamath River, not to chew old beef sticks laden with nitrates. So here we are at the put-in point on the river and looking forward to the next 7 days of bliss, punctuated by moments of stark terror in the rapids. This is my memory of Shasta-Trinity National Forest, just a short 35-years ago.

But our 2013 trip will offer much more than just a river and trees and beef jerky:

Day (1) will be transition day from the heat of Southern CA to the heat of Northern CA. We'll spend the night at the historic Jeffrey Hotel in beautiful downtown Coulterville. The early-birds will get the rooms with the private baths. The others, not so much. Maybe just a short jump across the hall or down the hall, whatever.

Day (2) will take us through the region of the CA Gold Country, with a planned lunch stop somewhere around Sacramento; maybe my favorite place – Fat City, in Old Town. In the afternoon we resort to the freeway to get us up to Red Bluff. What can you say about Red Bluff that hasn't been said before? I dunno, never been there! Overnight at the BW (Best Western).

Day (3) begins the adventure in the mountains. We'll head west and then north to a wide-spot in the road called Weaverville; probably for lunch. Then we will proceed north through the magnificent forest, all the way to Yreka (pron. why-reeka). How about another BW? Here's another place I've only passed while driving to Oregon.

Day (4) we'll follow the Klamath River as it winds its way through the heart of Big-Foot Country and also pass through Happy Camp for those who need a chew. Lunch will be wherever we can find it, possibly in Happy Camp or maybe not in Happy Camp. I dunno. We're spending the night in Fortuna at, yes, another BW.

Day (5) and we're heading south on Highway 101, skirting the Pacific Ocean as we go through the Big Trees. I'm thinking lunch around Willits. Then we continue south into the CA Wine Country and some gracious little but well known wine towns. Our destination for tonight is Napa. Maybe another BW? Yes, of course.

Day (6) and we're all lined up for the fast ride back home on Interstate 5. Probably Coalinga for lunch; or not. Nobody goes hungry on I-5

So there it is. Six days & five nights with the flavor of Gold Country, Big Tree Country, The Forest Back-Country, and Wine Country. A total of 1600 miles, for an average daily spin of about 267 miles.

## Route 66 "The Mother Road" Ride": (formerly Landers/ Integratron Tour)

This was planned as a Saturday/Sunday overnight with a visit to the Integratron near Landers with dinner at Pappy and Harriet's in Pioneertown. Who knew the Integratron would be sold out months in advance!! Well, there is always next year !! After conferring with our Senior Road Captain Jerry Stern and his partner Cindy, the decision was made to make this into a day ride, and what a day it was !! This turned into a Route 66 "The Mother Road" ride !!

21 of us on 14 bikes left Millie's at 9:00 and headed up the 14 freeway. We picked up another couple on a bike along side the 14 to round out our group to 15 bikes and 23 of us. With the skies sunny, the temperature rising and winds calm we made quick work to our first stop at Charlie Brown's/McDonalds in Little Rock. After a brief break we pressed on heading for Victorville and our landmark lunch destination: *Emma Jean's Holland Burger!!* 

Emma Jean's is located on route 66 out in the middle of nothing just north of Victorville. It is a tiny quintessential diner that has been there almost forever!! They close at 12:30 but Shawna, the owner, had assured us as long as we were there by 12:30 we would be served!! Due to the size of our group and the beautiful weather we grabbed seats at outside picnic ta-

Streetmasters: While not an official club ride, 4 of us attended the Streetmasters precision riding workshop on March 23rd held at Willow Springs racetrack. Friday J.B., Caroline and Joe/Bob rode up to Lancaster where we checked into the Hampton Inn. We gathered with Walt Fulton and many of his crew and other riders and headed to dinner. We had a great evening visiting with the many instructors and other riders. That night, the winds came up to nearly 80mph and it was COLD. Not to worry, however, as the next morning the sun was shining and the wind had stopped so a perfect day for riding was in order. The approximately 20 riders were up and ready to go.

Glen Jace joined us Saturday morning and we kicked off with a classroom session discussing cornering concepts and other safety techniques that we would later practice on the track. We headed up to the track where they broke us into two groups, with one group going out on the track and the other group practicing turning, stopping, weaving and other slow speed maneuvers. These two groups alternated thoughout the day. Within each group we were further broke down to subgroups with no more than 4 riders per instructor.

We rode "horse thief" mile which was full of curves and built into a steep hillside. It was a really great track to work on techniques as they lead us around the track and we took turns leading each subgroup.

Walt and the crew gave us a ton if individual instruction along with fun, food and beverages. We all came away with greater skills for riding the curvy roads as well as slow speed maneuvering. The highlight for me was at the end of the day they let us run alone on the track. Doug, one of the instructors, was behind me and we opened up the throttles and let her rip!! We traded following and leading around the track as we both pushed our bikes to the limit. What a blast!!!


