## Wyoming: Yellowstone to the Tetons: 2012

### Part 2 of 3:

In this second leg of our journey we continue with my Wyoming: Yellowstone, Teton excursion as we find our lone rider traveling from Cody, to Jackson, Wyoming via Yellowstone National Park.

#### Sept. 11<sup>th</sup>: Cody to Jackson, WY (300 miles):

Packed and ready to head out of Cody, I am very concerned with the minimal tread on my rear tire which would not have safely made it home. When I left LA I asked two shops if they thought I had enough tread on the rear tire and both agreed that I had at least 5,000 miles left. However, the roads through AZ, UT and WY are rougher than in California which enables the rain and snow to melt faster and hopefully to improve vehicle handling. Traveling at 80+ mph really wears the treads fast. When I originally arrived in Cody it was late on a Friday night and I found that the only two MC shops were closed until Tuesday....all gone hunting, fishing or riding. The nearest HD dealer was in Billings, MT approximately 100 mi to the North, and although they had the tire in stock, I was actually heading to Jackson which is to the South.

Tuesday morning I take a chance and stop by this new small MC shop in Cody (Thads Cycle Shop) and not only are they open for business they actually have the tire. While I wait for the installation, I figure I have enough time to walk over to

the HD dealer store (clothing only) in Cody and pick up some required T-Shirts. I spot a warehouse-type sporting goods store on a back street and I find myself being reeled in to take a look-see. Although not on the level of a Bass Pro or Cabella's, I can't believe the amount of firearms, ammunition and hunting supplies that are displayed in this facility. I saw stuff that I have not seen in catalogs or larger stores and the sales people were definitely small-town friendly.

Now confident that I can complete my trip with a new rear tire, I race out of town on Rt 20 heading West into Yellowstone Park where my Golden Age Passports gets me in for free again. I follow this route to the middle of the Park and hang a left on Rt-287 heading for the South exit of the Park transversing through green-tree inundated mountains and valleys, similar to the southern ride out of Lake Tahoe to the Rt. 50 freeway.

After a number of short road-work delays, I enter Teton National Park and while I am taking a picture of my bike with the sign as a backdrop, two couples approach and offer to take a picture of me "on" the bike. They are amazed when I show them my electric jacket which now serves as an entrée to my pointing out all my other exotic devices. Two days later I meet them again while I am backing out of a parking spot of a museum and they acknowledge from their car "you are the guy with the electric jacket".



I make it a practice to stop in at the park's Ranger stations to check on the local sights and at this one I am told not to just stay on Rt-89 but to take a right turn on Antelope Flats Rd, a much more scenic route and follow it in a circle back to Rt-89 into Jackson. On the way, I spot what looks like a statue of a spotted antelope only to be shocked into reality when it bolts from my approach. That's a city boy for you! Next I stop to see the

remains of an old Mormon Town (Mormon Row) and meet a guy on a dirt bike from San Diego camping nearby. We exchange some travel talk and I head out.

I am almost at the junction back to Rt-89 when I see cars pulled off the highway and a herd of buffalo leisurely crossing the road. I coast to the side of the road, shut off the engine and dismount. I am assuming that most of you have seen a buffalo, however when I suddenly realized that they were very close to me and that there was nothing but the bike between them and me and just how large they are, I suddenly realized my precarious situation when the real possibility of danger suddenly becomes a reality. Not to keep you in suspense; I survived and thank God for the extra underwear.



I checked into my motel (Golden Eagle Inn) just down the block from the center of the town and headed for the Hong Kong Buffet for dinner. The food and ambiance was very commercial but there were a lot of Asian folks in there. They must have been on a tour because when I went out to my bike they were all standing around it snapping pictures. I asked them if they wanted to take pictures of each other on the bike and like kids, they jumped at the chance. As I rumbled away they all waved goodbye.

On the way back to the motel I stopped to get gas and ran into a couple of Viet Nam Vets M/C members each riding their own bikes and trying to

find a room for the night with no luck. It was 9pm and the closest town was South and an hour away. So I turned on my GPS and went to work giving them telephone numbers of various hotels. Everything was filled but I noticed a Resort two miles outside of town; they called, got directions but did not ask about the price. I later found out that this Resort charged upwards of \$300 per night so I hope that I never run into them again as he was a big guy and she was no lightweight either.

Sept. 12-14: Jackson, WY:

Jackson-Shopping: Jackson is a great small western town sporting wooden sidewalks and a one-block town square in the center. There are high-end shops and restaurants everywhere with very "healthy" prices, beautiful art work and artistic building designs. However, I must admit that they contain some of the best merchandise I have ever seen without being presented in an ostentatious Beverly Hills, CA or Aspen, CO type manner.

Teton Village and the Aerial Tramway: Leaving town on Rt-22 heading West, I turned onto Moose Wilson Road which on the map appears to be a paved road. After 5 miles of normal road, to my surprise and dismay, it turned into a broken-up dirt road with ruts and rocks which I rode with a death grip. I was committed at this point. I pulled into Teton Village which is in Jackson Hole. This is the winter mountain resort for skiing and for some reason I always thought that the town of Jackson was Jackson Hole. I think that this is a common mistake for first time visitors. I took the tram up to the top but due to a major fire plaguing Jackson and the Jackson Hole valley, you could not see much of the beautiful valley through the smoke. It seems that a local rancher, living just over the hill from Jackson, thought his fire in a steel drum had run its course and lit-out-for-town leaving the fire unattended. For most of the week Jackson was on the verge of evacuation.

Chapel of Transfiguration: Just off Teton Park Road, which parallels Rt-89 but is much more of a country road, lays this small log cabin-church with a glass-windowed view of the Tetons. Aside from the Grand Room of the palatial Jackson Lake Lodge which has tremendous window this is one of the best picture opportunities in the area.

Scenic Float Trip down the Snake River: After checking out many brochures for this easy going, guided, large rubber-raft trip which travels down the ‘scenic

center” of the Snake River, I chose the Barker-Ewing group at \$70 because they were touted as the best guides. They were correct. When I arrived at the bus, who do I run into, but the two couples from the Teton sign and the parking lot the day before. We sat together on one side of the raft and bantered dialog back and forth for the whole trip.

Jackson Hole Playhouse: A local in-town dinner playhouse. It was 6pm when I returned to my motel and figured I had just enough time to change and see if there was a seat available at the dinner show starting a 8pm. I called and was informed that they had room but that due to the fire they were starting an hour earlier at 7pm. I changed, jumped on the bike and was there just in time for the show itself. “The Ballad of Cat Ballou” was much better as a musical and the actor playing Lee Marvin’s part was actually funnier and better. There was some audience participation and Lee

One couple was from Ohio and the other couple was from Florida. The two couples had met on a cruise a few years ago and now love to travel together and make a great foursome. As we talked, Ellen would spot an eagle or something and ask the guide to stop the raft so she could take a picture (you had to be there!). After they shared their sandwiches and chips with me and during one of our back and forth banter, I asked George if he was from New York since he did not have an accent but bantered like a New Yorker. He quickly retorted “Yes, why?” to which I responded, “I only meant that in a most respectful way”, generating laughter from the others on the raft.


And if that isn’t enough for you, don’t forget our Summer Party, Progressive Breakfast, Holiday Party, 11-Club Meetings and all those Saturdays.


**Cell Buckle: Electronics Mounting Bracket**

Where do you put all the electronic devices we need to survive when riding a motorcycle? There are many products on the market which attach to our handlebars and most of them are a bit pricey and many only fit specific electronic devices. This little inexpensive and innovative gadget allows you to attach almost any portable electronic device to your bike. It then allows you to easily remove just the device without also having to remove the mounting bracket itself when you park your machine.



No tools are required to mount this bracket; just snap it over the handlebars and slip the two rubber rings over the separated section to secure; just in case. To attach your device to the holder, insert the device between the top and bottom movable anchors and push them together until the device is locked securely in place by the two overlapping rubber ends.

**How to Buckle: Step 1**



NOTE: Please make all adjustments to your de-

vice before riding off and avoid interacting with the electronic device while driving.

The product is made of durable, flexible plastic and rubber components. Examples of electronic devices could be: GPS, Cell Phones, Cameras, MP3 players, or any other flat square or rectangular device; limited only by your imagination. The Buckle can also be used on car steering wheels; bicycles, baby carriages, shopping carts golf carts, ATV's; boats or even medical strollers.

There are two sizes available The CB1 for 1' to 1-1/4" diameter (larger handlebars ie HD Trike or steering wheels or the CB2 for 7/8" to 1' diameter (most Harley handlebars.

Now you can take your portable device along with you and avoid having to fumble around with it while you are driving leaving your hands free to concentrate on safe riding.

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
Dec. 21, 2012 – The End of Days or A New Beginning?

The standards of acceptance are business ethics, application techniques and chemical selection that far exceed most companies not in the program.
